II. SELECTION CRITERIA

Induction into the Cooperative Hall of Fame is the highest honor that the cooperative community bestows on those men and women whose endeavors in the cause of the cooperative form of enterprise have been GENUINELY HEROIC. The Cooperative Hall of Fame provides recognition for persons contributing in especially significant ways to the enhancement of the cooperative idea and its broader acceptance in the United States, or to the substantial advancement of cooperative enterprise in any of its various forms.

In making its decision, the Selection Committee considers the following criteria within the environment in which the nominee lived and worked. In order to help the Committee make its selection, please list the major contributions and activities of the nominee relating to these criteria: (Use additional pages, not to exceed 10 typed pages double spaced.)

1. Demonstrated statesmanship, innovation, personal commitment, leadership, and vision beyond the professional competence and requirements of the position for which he/she was employed to serve within the cooperative sector.

If nominee did not hold office in the cooperative movement, please indicate how he/she demonstrated the same qualities to advance the cooperative form of enterprise.

2. Achieved identifiable and lasting changes to improve and promote cooperatives.
3. Inspired and persuaded others to act to advance the cooperative system.
4. Recognized nationally for work in or relating to cooperatives.

Please attach not less than three and not more than 10 letters of endorsement that relate to one or more of the selection criteria.

America's Legacy of Cooperation

Established in 1974 by the National Cooperative Business Association, the prestigious Cooperative Hall of Fame serves to honor those distinguished individuals whose contributions to cooperative business have been genuinely heroic. Inductees are selected for their genuinely heroic contributions to the cooperative idea and to the advancement of the principles of cooperation and cooperative enterprise in the United States.

The Cooperative Hall of Fame is housed in the National Cooperative Business Center in Washington, D.C., where a permanent collection of commemorative plaques tells of the contributions made by each selected cooperative leader.

Inductees are limited to a prestigious group carefully selected to preserve the nature of this special recognition. It is a distinct honor to be inducted into the Cooperative Hall of Fame. Each year a select few men and women distinguished by their cooperative leadership and caliber are added to this elite roster.

The administration of the Cooperative Hall of Fame is entrusted to the Cooperative Development Foundation. Nominations are received annually from the cooperative community and reviewed by a screening and a selection committee, each composed of current leaders from the various sectors of the U.S. cooperative movement.

The Cooperative Hall of Fame induction ceremony is also a major fund raising event of the Foundation. It is fitting that the occasion to bestow the highest honor of the cooperative community on those individuals who have selflessly given of their lives to promote cooperatives, is also a vehicle to raise funds to perpetuate their work and life-long commitment.
